Introduction

Once again, we are pleased to showcase a year of continued success in both research outputs, high-profile events, and the development of staff as researchers.

The 2015/16 year saw the Faculty of Business & Management placing a greater emphasis on creating development opportunities for early career lecturers who wanted to develop their research and scholarship focus. Seminars and workshops were complemented by a highly appreciated writing retreat. Research workshops for developing methodologies were organised and hosted by prominent researchers such as Professor Catherine Cassell and Professor Nicholas O'Regan.

In addition, the year also saw a greater number of applications for research support and attendance at the faculty's research seminars and workshops. This has coincided with more applications for research project funding being submitted externally. The faculty was successful in securing funding from RIA, the Heritage Lottery Fund, the Higher Education Academy and British Leverhulme Trust.

The Faculty of Arts, Humanities & Social Sciences had a productive year with its staff members producing five books, numerous articles and making a significant number of appearances in the national and international media. We also ran a number of successful events including visits from H.E. Teresita Vicente, the Cuban ambassador to the UK, Lieutenant General Roméo Dallaire the former Force Commander of the United Nations Assistance



Mission in Rwanda, and the Rt Hon. Keith Vaz MP, Chair of the Home Affairs Committee. The faculty also continued to support staff by providing funding for conference funding and research training.

In the Regent's Institute of Languages & Culture, besides the regular research activities represented by doctoral examinations, national and international conference papers, texts in books, journals and

conference proceedings, the Institute had one of its staff complete a PhD. It also successfully secured funding for a two-year project, 'Language policies in Europe and Asia', and had the opportunity to run an excellent panel, with internationally renowned speakers from India, Brazil, UK and USA, on the 'Future of English Language Teaching' in autumn 2016.

Centre for Banking and Finance

The Centre for Banking and Finance (CBF) continued promoting international academic events and high-quality research in different areas of banking and finance, in collaboration with other academic institutions and affiliates overseas. The most relevant activities and initiatives promoted by the CBF in the academic year 2015 – 2016 are reported here.

Seminar with Dr Andrea Enria, Chairperson of the European Banking Authority

In April 2016 the CBF organised a seminar, 'From Bank Bail-outs to Bail-in: Where is the Impact?', in which the Centre hosted as keynote speaker Dr. Andrea Enria, Chairperson of the European Banking Authority (a EU authority in charge of macroprudential banking regulation based in London). The keynote speaker is very distinguished and it was a unique opportunity for our students and colleagues to learn and discuss with the chairman of the most relevant authority involved in the current debate about banking crises resolutions in Europe.

International Workshop on Risk Management, Financial Regulation, and Governance in Banking: Perspectives and Challenges of the European Banking Union

In May 2016 the University of Palermo, Italy, in partnership with the CBF, Universidad Autonoma de Madrid and the UCEIF Foundation organised a very interesting one-day workshop in Palermo on the above topic. Highly distinguished academics – Professor Giovanni Barone-Adesi from Swiss Italian University, Professor Rainer Masera from Guglielmo Marconi University, Professor Santiago Carbo from Bangor University and Professor Andrea Resti from Bocconi University

– presented papers and researches on risk management, financial regulation and governance. Professor G. Vento and Dr C. Kallandranis presented their research and also gave a seminar each at Palermo University.

International Academic Conference on Economics, Finance and Energy: Which Challenges in the Current Geopolitical Framework?

In April 2016 the CBF, with the active collaboration of Dr Christos Kallandranis and Dr Asieh Tabaghdehi, organised and hosted a one-day academic conference on economics, finance and energy at Regent's. A number of papers were selected for the two sessions on finance and energy. Two distinguished keynote speakers were involved in the conference. Two of the papers presented were prepared by Professor Vento in collaboration with two PhD candidates from Sapienza University of Rome who were previously hosted by the CBF.

Regent's University London's Inaugural Wealth Management Forum 2016

In May 2016 the CBF, with the active collaboration of Dr Andrew Schmidt, organised an interesting and successful seminar on wealth management, which put together distinguished academics and practitioners. Professor Jose Dapena from UCEMA University (Argentina) gave his closing remarks to the event.

International Academy of Management and Business Conference

The CBF hosted a three-day International Academy of Management and Business Conference at Regent's in September 2016. This academic event takes place bi-annually, with delegates

from all over the world. The IAMB Conference helps to enhance the international academic reputation of Regent's, strengthens the network with academic peers, and facilitates access for Regent's academics to journal publications, among other benefits.

The Open Review of Management, Banking and Finance

The *Open Review of Management, Banking and Finance*, created by the CBF in collaboration with the Capriglione Foundation in 2014, is becoming an established and recognised academic journal. It has published 17 academic articles so far by academics from a variety of countries. Our goal is to have it recognised within the ABS ranking in the next two years.

Foreign academics hosted by the Centre

The CBF hosted three foreign academics, who spend a research period at Regent's University London. They were Professor Jose Dapena (Head of the Department of Finance at UCEMA University, Argentina), Professor Enzo Scannella (Associate Professor of Banking and Finance at University of Palermo, Italy) and Professor Valerio Lemma (Associate Professor of Banking Law at Guglielmo Marconi University). With the latter two there are research projects going on and Professor Lemma also published an article with one of our members (Dr John Thorp).

Foreign PhD candidates hosted by the Centre

The CBF hosted two PhD candidates from Sapienza University of Rome – Helen Chiappini and Giuseppe Lia – who performed a part of their research at Regent's. From this collaboration, two academic articles in collaboration with Professor Vento resulted.

Professor Vento appointed as external examiner for a PhD candidate from Granada University (Spain)

In the framework of the networking activities promoted by the CBF with other universities, Professor Vento has been appointed as external examiner for a PhD candidate from Granada University (Spain). The PhD candidate works at the European Central Bank.

Academic Collaboration with UCEMA University, Argentina

In May 2016, Professor Vento, thanks to the financial support of the Erasmus programme, was hosted by the UCEMA University, where he gave seminars on the Banking Union as well as on microfinance.

Cooperation Agreement with the International Center for Banking and Corporate Governance (ICBCG), Ukraine

In February 2016 the CBF signed a cooperation agreement with the International Center for Banking and Corporate Governance (ICBCG), Ukraine, addressed to jointly perform online workshops and seminars, researches, joint papers and conferences.

Cooperation Agreement with Sapienza University of Rome, Italy

The CBF finalised an agreement with Sapienza University of Rome for the CBF to host a limited number of PhD candidates who are interested in doing research at Regent's.

Seminar with Prometeia

In the autumn the CBF hosted a seminar on risk management in banking with representatives of Prometeia, a successful consultancy firm with offices in several different countries who is interested in having contact with our students in order to consider them for recruitment.

Networks of Power



Dr Tom Villis, director

Networks of Power is a research centre that brings together scholars at Regent's University London to work on the construction of power relations at a national and international level. The centre holds a number of events to bring together academics and policy makers and we provide advice to governments and institutions all over the world. Members of the research centre maintain a strong presence in the international media.

International Speakers' Seminar

Our international speakers' seminar, organised and chaired by Professor Yossi Mekelberg, continues to attract people to Regent's University London to hear some of the world's most important political figures and diplomats engage with the academic community.

Highlights of the 2015-16 programme have been:

- 2 March 2016: H.E. Teresita Vicente, Cuban Ambassador to the UK
- 24 January 2016: Lieutenant-General Roméo Dallaire, former Force Commander of the United Nations Assistance Mission in Rwanda (UNAMIR) (1993-1994), and founder of the Roméo Dallaire Child Soldiers Initiative
- 24 November 2015: Tim Marshall, former Sky News Diplomatic Editor
- 26 October 2015: *In the Shadow of War* Screening of the film followed by Q&A with the directors Georgia and Sophia Scott
- 26 October 2015: Rt Hon Keith Vaz MP, Chair of the Home Affairs Committee and Former Minister of State for Europe

Building on our conference in 2014-15, we also organised two public lectures on the memory and legacy of war:

A lecture by the art critic for the *Jewish Chronicle* on Jewish Artists and the First World War.

Religion Power and Politics

Tom Villis continued to work on his book project, *Religion Minorities and Englishness*. This project is concerned with two related questions: firstly, the extent to which expressions of Englishness consciously or unconsciously excluded religious minorities and, secondly, the ways in which religious minorities define and express their own ideas of Englishness. He is also pursuing a related project on the political and social views of David Jones, the Anglo-Welsh artist and poet, who is increasingly recognised as one of the most important – and neglected – figures of modernism. This involves work on the Catholic intellectual community with which Jones was involved, with archival sources at the National Library of Wales, Aberystwyth (where Jones's papers are held), Georgetown Library in Washington D.C. (which owns many of the literary papers of British Catholic writers) and various locations in England.

Christopher Daily continued his collaboration with Cambridge University Press on the history of dissenting academies (some of which is published, see appendix below). He has developed his role as associate fellow of the University of Groningen's research group working on the 'Critical Concepts and Methods for the Study of Religion in Modern China'. He continues to work on his second monograph, which is a study of the earliest Protestant theological library imported into China via Malacca during the nineteenth century.

Human Rights

Regent's University London and Networks of Power academics are at the forefront of human rights policy formulation. Neven Andjelic continued as an Expert Member of the Council of Europe's Advisory Committee on the Framework Convention for the Protection of National Minorities and visited many parts of Europe as part of this role in 2015/16. He also put together an Erasmus+ grant application with collaborators in the University of Montenegro.

Regent's Complexity Studio

Orit Gal's team at Regent's University London launched their report in June 2015 on *Reclaiming Agency: How to Save Advertising (and Build a Better World)*. Orit Gal and Kate Fanning were praised for 'designing the research project, supporting the analysis and providing academic rigour'. In particular, representatives from the advertising industry praised the team for helping them to 'look at the world of advertising through new eyes. This is a good example of how research in the social science can help ethical entrepreneurship. Politics and Security

Professor Yossi Mekelberg continued to build his reputation as one of the foremost public intellectuals concerned with politics and security in the Middle East. He produced a weekly column for *Al Arabiya*, provided expert comment as an associate fellow of the Royal Institute of International Affairs at Chatham House, and appeared numerous times in the mainstream media. Some of these activities are collected in the appendix.

Dr Álvaro Méndez continued his research on the rise of China in Latin America. He presented his work in Peru at the Universidad del Pacifico and in Cuba. His conclusions are being published in a forthcoming monograph, *Intervention by Invitation: How Colombia Negotiated US Participation in Plan Colombia*. He also continues to collaborate with the Global South Unit at the LSE and is publishing a co-authored book on China and Latin America.

Dr Sara Bazoobandi continued in her role as a member of Global Agenda Council (GAC) of the World Economic Forum 2014-2016. She attended GAC meetings in various parts of the world and produced work for the media, think-tanks and universities (see the appendix for examples).

Dr Caroline Varin continues to build her reputation as an expert on private security and the changing face of war. As well as participating in conferences all over the world, she has done extensive field work in Africa and produced a book on Boko Haram and the War on Terror.

Power and Performance

Networks of Power continued its innovative interdisciplinary research project with colleagues from the drama and performance programmes at Regent's University London. Mark Hamilton progressed his project on the aesthetic potential of Bharatanatyam (a South Asian performance genre). He worked with Shane Shambhu on the ways in which contemporary ideals of creative freedom and the strictures and transformative power of non-European hereditary forms might profitably interact.

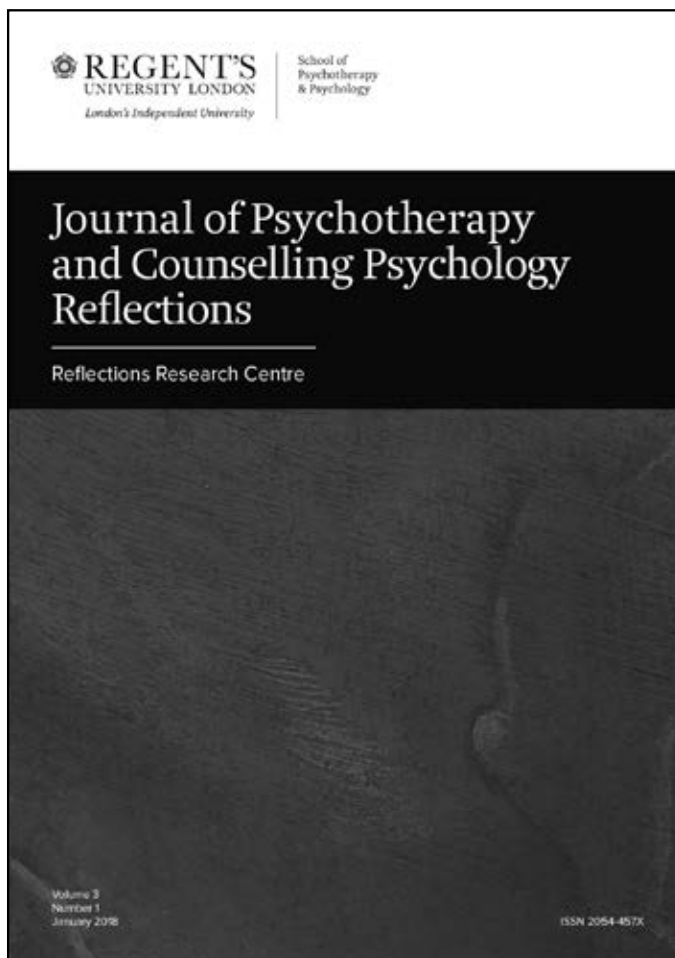

Regent's Centre for Transnational Studies



Professor Ibrahim Sirkeci, director

The Regent's Centre for Transnational Studies (RCTS) focuses on the transnational phenomena pushing disciplinary boundaries of management, economics, and other social sciences. The Centre also promotes advanced interdisciplinary research and teaching across a broad range of fields in social and management sciences. The RCTS advocates high-quality research and scholarship that has a wide scope of utilisation, going beyond academia, benefitting the whole society.

The Centre's research covers over six multi-disciplinary areas broadly defined as management, marketing, finance, mobility, higher education and cross-cultural studies with an overall emphasis on transnationalism. RCTS members contribute to the research streams either individually or in teams.

Developing and forging a transnational research community, RCTS enrolls and encourages faculty members from all parts of Regent's University London as well as inviting visiting researchers, carefully selected to collaborate with the members and contribute to the research output. In 2015-2016, the Centre hosted 12 visiting research fellows from the UK, China, Czech Republic, Germany, Greece, Italy and Turkey.

Research funding

The RCTS continued to generate external research funding. The Ria Financial sponsorship for the Named Professorship and the Heritage Lottery Fund grant for British Chinese heritage project continued. Visiting research fellows have also secured their own grants to support their research while at RCTS. A number of external grant applications were filed with the European Commission, British Academy and other funding bodies and decisions are pending.

Research events

RCTS members have been active contributors (chairs, session chairs, presenters and reviewers) to international and national academic conferences including the annual conferences of the British Academy of Management, Academy of Marketing, Turkish Migration Conference and European Sociological Association Conference.

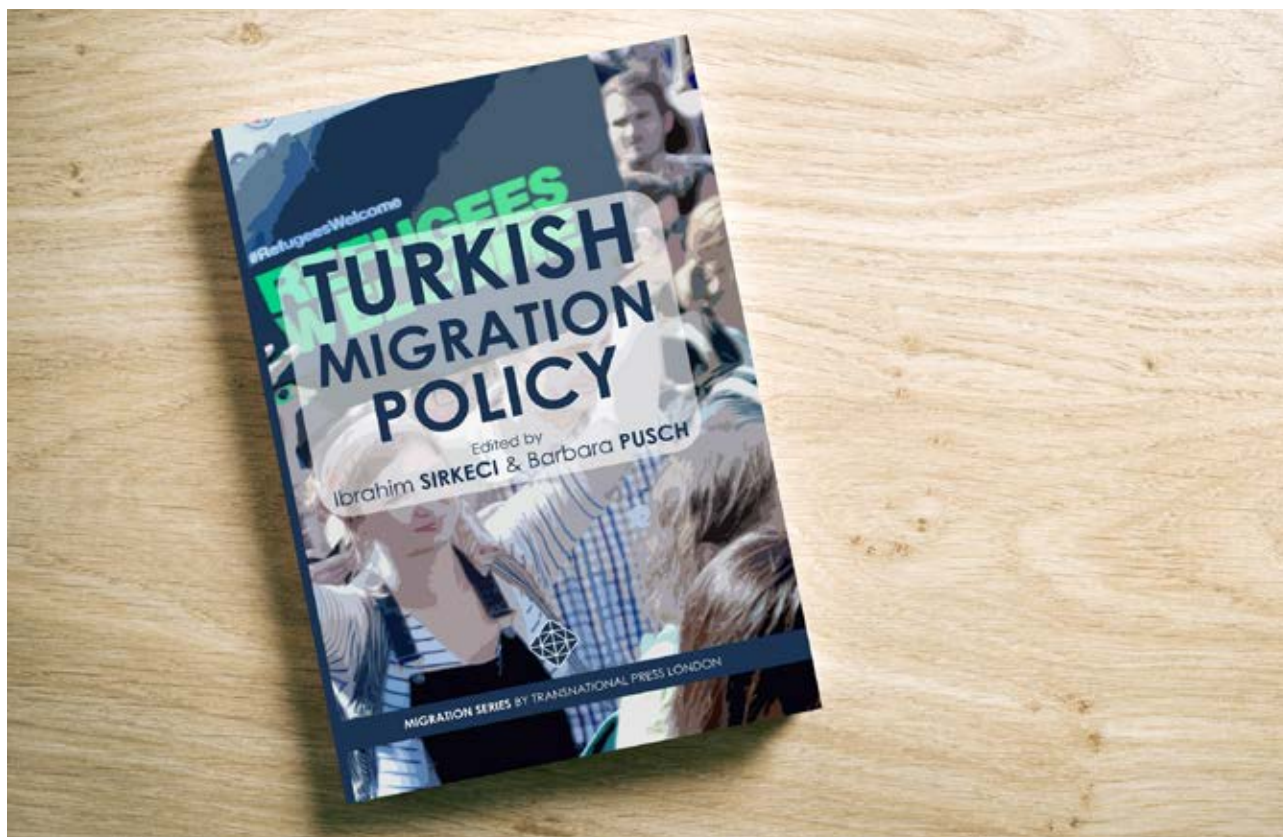

Featured New Book



Ibrahim Sirkeci, Barbara Pusch (eds.)

Turkish Migration Policy
(Transnational Press, 2016)

Migration has been a hot topic in public and academic debates. Turkey as a country hosting over three million refugees from Syria, the biggest humanitarian crisis seen in recent years, is an important case to look at. This book aims to shed light on changes in migration policy, the determinants beneath these changes, and the practical implications for movers and non-movers in Turkey. Nevertheless, one should note that Turkey has only recently faced mass immigration and the number of foreign-born has more than doubled in less than five years. Such sudden change in population composition warrants policy adjustments and reviews. Policy shift from 'exporting excess labour' in the 1960s and 1970s to immigrant integration today is a drastic but necessary one. Nevertheless, Turkish migration policy is still far from settled as several chapters in this book point out. Despite the exemplary humanitarian engagement in admitting Syrians, Turkey is still at the bottom of the league table of favourable integration policies with an overall score of 25 out of 100. Turkish migration policy is likely to be adjusted further in response to the continuing immigration.

About the editors

Barbara Pusch studied sociology, Turkology, philosophy, and ethnology at the University of Vienna. She received her PhD at the University of Vienna with a dissertation on the Green movement in Turkey and then went on to complete various projects on women and Islam in Turkey. Since November 2015, she has worked as a research assistant to the Director at the Orient-Institut Istanbul.

Ibrahim Sirkeci is Professor of Transnational Studies and Marketing and the Director of the Regent's Centre for Transnational Studies (RCTS) at Regent's University London. Prior to joining Regent's University London, Sirkeci worked at the University of Bristol. His main areas of expertise are human mobility, labour markets, remittances, transnational marketing and consumers and segmentation. He is the editor of several journals, including *Migration Letters* and *Remittances Review*. His key books include *Migration and Remittances during the Global Financial Crisis and Beyond* (World Bank, 2012 with J. Cohen and D. Ratha), and *Cultures of Migration, the global nature of contemporary mobility* (University of Texas Press, 2011 with J. Cohen). He has chaired the Migration Conferences since 2012.

Featured Researchers



Dr Yunzhen Liu

My interests in research have been influenced by a number of distinctive scholars and experts. I came to the UK to undertake my MA studies in September 2000, firstly an MA in intercultural communication with Professor Helen Spencer-Oatey, who established the first course in the UK, and then an MA in applied linguistics (TEFL) at Luton University.

As an international student in this country, my concern was how international students coped with their anxiety and uncertainty and typically how Chinese students dealt with their stress and anxiety and got on with their lives and studies here in the UK. My initial interest in research was therefore investigating anxiety – general, cultural and foreign language anxiety – as major factors inhibiting students' learning achievements.

Later, I embarked on a part-time doctoral journey in the field of educational and applied linguistics while teaching Chinese language at Newcastle University with Professor Vivian Cook, the world's leading language education expert. With the 2008 Beijing Olympic Games coming, there was heat in learning English, therefore I wanted to look at Chinese people's motivation in learning English. However, an overseas Chinese language teacher training course at East China Normal University in China changed my direction of thesis.

During the course, I gradually realised that research on English as a second language acquisition has flourished during the past few decades. However, as a new discipline, Chinese as a foreign/second language can boast only 20 years of history. Research in this area has not only been limited, but to some degree unbalanced.

Most CFL/CSL research has been conducted in the US and China. The subject has received scant attention in other countries, including the UK. It was imperative that research in this discipline was conducted in a wider context. In addition, learning Chinese as a foreign language and learning Chinese as a heritage language are two different things. Scholars have stressed the importance of recognising the distinctive needs of HL learners and traditional FL students.

All of these factors made me ponder. I thought perhaps I should shift my direction from the aspect of English as a second language to Chinese as a second language and Chinese as a heritage language. I discussed with the experts at East China Normal University during the course. Professor Shizhen Mao encouraged this shift and commented that my work on Chinese heritage language learning and education will be 'boundless and uncountable kindness, merits and contribution' (as it was so urgent and significant). His original words in Chinese were '功德无量'.

I was really thrilled by Professor Mao's encouragement and started my journey investigating how heritage and non-heritage Chinese students learn the Chinese language. As affective factors such as individual differences and learner strategies have hardly been investigated, I decided to investigate heritage and non-heritage Chinese students' learning strategies, motivations, and language learning beliefs. My study was conducted using both quantitative and qualitative methods. The study addresses questions of both theoretical and pedagogical significance, and makes specific proposals regarding ways to improve pedagogy for UK heritage and non-heritage Chinese students.

As a member of the British Chinese Language Teachers Society, I was able to use this network and receive support from 18 mainstream British universities, colleges and senior high schools. I collected a sample of 278 Chinese language students (142 non-heritage students, 117 heritage students). My examiners commented that my thesis represents a very good, systematic and multi-methodological study of an under-researched, yet very important area. My external examiner, Professor Itesch Sachdev from SOAS, University of London, *even commented that my thesis is 'Gold'*. He encouraged me to publish it. Responsive to the Professor Sachdev's comment, I shared my findings in a number of national and international conferences and published my thesis by Scholars Press.

Most of my professional life has had to do with education, and with language education to be specific. Having taught Spanish and English in my home country, Spain, and the US, I entered higher education in the UK in the mid-90s.

In my years at Regent's I have found opportunities to reflect on my teaching practice and share experiences with likeminded professionals. An important experience was the launch in 2014 of ELE-UK, the UK Association for the Teaching and Learning of Spanish in Higher Education, which I created together with colleagues from other UK universities. ELE-UK (www.eleuk.org) was established to provide a space for debate and collaboration among teaching practitioners of Spanish as a foreign language (ELE) and to contribute to the recognition of these professionals. The association, which I have chaired from the outset, organises a yearly conference that has become a reference point within the national and international subject specialist circuit, where I have presented some of my research.

In recent years I have disseminated and published work in two distinct, but related, strands that focus on language learners and on ways to enhance their learning.

Collaborative language learning through technology

I am a keen user of digital tools, which I normally incorporate into my teaching. As a result of that practice, I have delivered papers on computer-mediated communication (CMC) for foreign language learning (ELE-UK 2013, London), published by MarcoELE in Spain (2013), and also on engaging students through interactive tools in the language class (ACIS, London 2013). Both studies confirmed that the lecturer's motivation and engagement with innovation and technology is the key ingredient to ensure students' engagement with

interactive technology for collaborative language learning, particularly within the blended format provided by VLEs. With regards to social media, I have led teacher training on Twitter for language professional development. (ELEUK2015, Nottingham).

The development of professional skills through language learning

There is a consensus that graduates who speak foreign languages find work more easily and often with better wages; however, students, employers and language lecturers themselves are not always aware of the variety of work-related skills developed while learning a foreign language. The background for this research, which I conduct jointly with Dr Victoria Pastor González, was the Languages an Employability Conference held at Regent's in 2015, where we proposed a model for the development of employability that represents the journey learners embark upon, a journey simultaneous to the acquisition of the language. The developmental model and the case study we built around it was included as a chapter in *Employability for languages: a handbook* (2016).

At present, we are seeking to bring into the foreign languages area the current debate around the HEA Employability Framework. Data collected in two cohorts of our students of Spanish, supports our claim that in order for students to internalise employability through language learning, it has to be discussed explicitly in the language class within the framework of a strategy both holistic and targeted. The developmental model and recent findings have produced various conference papers, the most recent on articulating an employability narrative for modern languages modules was delivered at the PedRIO conference (Plymouth, January 2017) where our developmental model was of particular interest for other language departments.

My most recent research project, #CulturaTándem, combines the above areas of collaborative learning, digital tools and professional skills. This project explores the benefits of virtual collaboration for research by student tandems from Regent's University London and SDI Munich, one of Regent's international partners. Through a number of weeks, student tandems at both locations collaborated online and researched topics related to the Spanish-speaking world. All students were fully appreciative of the benefits derived from the experience for their professional future. The study *#CulturaTándem, preparing students for today's multicultural societies*, submitted for publication in Germany, highlights the positive effect of this type of online collaboration in the development of students' global citizenship.

Regent's on the Conference Scene

Several opportunities arose during 2015-16 to develop my disciplinary research on entrepreneurship and family business, as well as in related pedagogic directions, through nine academic conferences and events. This scholarly activity has enhanced my international networks, promoted Regent's University London and generated publications in academic journals, books and conference materials. As well as the research and pedagogic funding provided through the European Union (EU) Erasmus+ scheme and the Higher Education Academy (HEA), credit must also be given to Faculty and University for supporting such activity and continuing to develop capabilities through its programmes of development and training.

These conferences were held in various locations in the UK (Birmingham, Brighton, London, Chichester and Leicester) and abroad (Rotterdam), attracting international participants. My attendance at the Rotterdam entrepreneurship conferences was funded through the EU's Erasmus+ scheme and the entrepreneurship-related pedagogic work describes in part the completion of research funded by the HEA. Each of these conferences and events is addressed in this report but entrepreneurship in Rotterdam is the principal focus.

Rotterdam: Positive Management 2015 and Global Entrepreneurship 2016

With support through the Erasmus+ scheme, I participated in the Positive Management Conference in 2015 and was invited to be jury president for the students' new venture presentations at the Global Entrepreneurship Conference in 2016, both held in the Netherlands at the Rotterdam University of Applied Sciences (RUAS). The focus of these international events was on entrepreneurship and on innovative entrepreneurial approaches to management, both of which directly supported my research on a variety of aspects of entrepreneurship and family business. The Positive Management Conference was jointly organised by the RUAS Entrepreneurship

& Business Innovation Research Centre and the Nicolaus Copernicus University of Toruń, Poland. The Global Entrepreneurship Conference was set up by the RUAS School of Commercial Management Studies in close collaboration with Artevelde University of Ghent, Belgium.

The information gathered and contacts made at these events subsequently supported the further development of a joint Regent's working paper with Chris Swaffin-Smith (RWPBM1501) into an academic journal paper: O'Leary, S. and Swaffin-Smith, C. (2016), Organic model to reflect the transitional nature of family firms, *The Marketing Review*, Vol.16, No.3, pp.285-297.

Entrepreneurship-related pedagogy

There is also a strong link between entrepreneurship and pedagogy, particularly the influences that entrepreneurship-related education can have on the development and enhancement of graduate attributes, especially graduate employability. The Rotterdam links therefore helped in completing the final phase of the funded research for the HEA Strategic Enhancement Programme on Embedding Employability into the Curriculum, with a presentation at the final event in Birmingham and its publication: O'Leary, S. (2016), Embedding employability into the curriculum: Strategic Enhancement Programme Funded Research Paper, *Higher Education Academy Publications*, York.

Over the academic year, these initiatives were also incorporated into my research portfolio and further disseminated across the academic disciplines to colleagues at conferences in Brighton (Arts & Humanities), London and Leicester (STEM), at events hosted

by the Universities of Chichester and Loughborough, and at the Government conference with business and industry at the Department of Business Innovation and Skills. Contacts made led to advising Queen Mary University London on their QConsult module with employers and three further publications: O'Leary, S.
