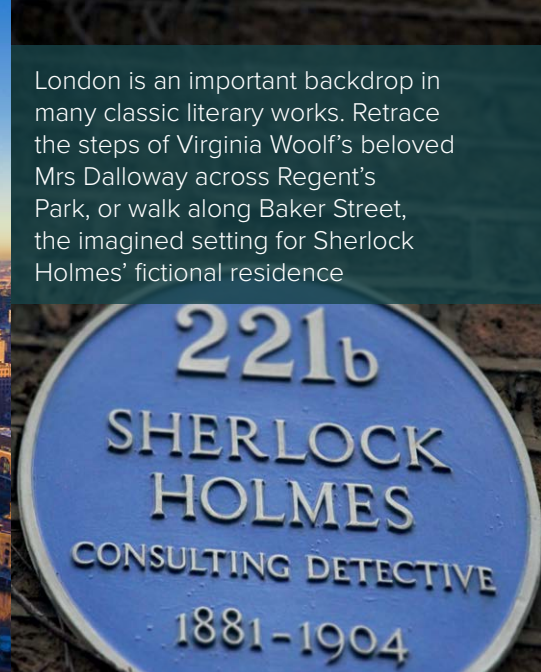

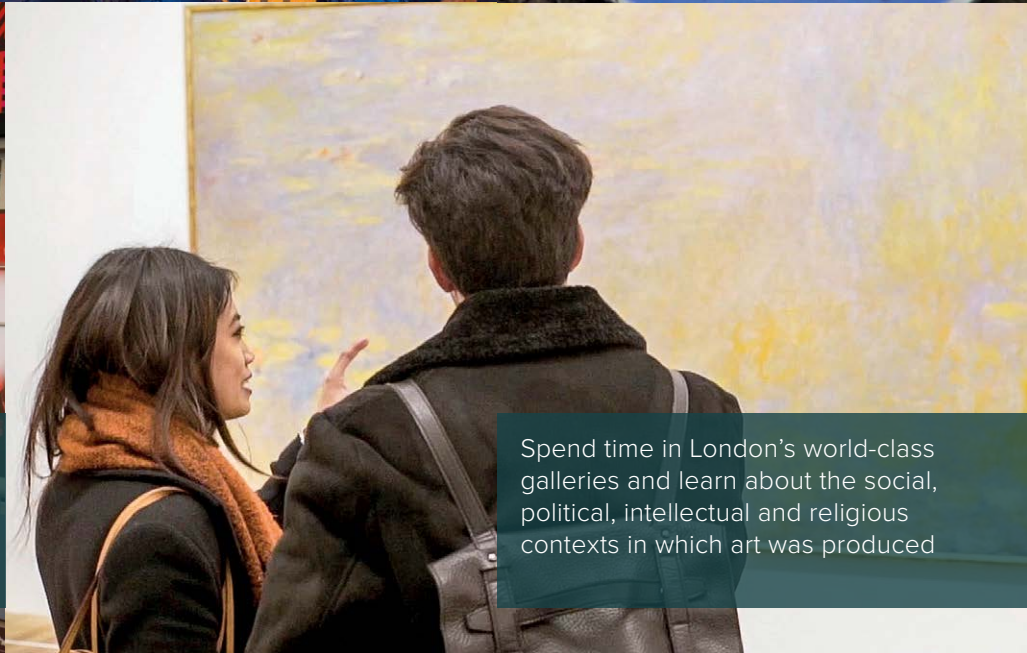
A liberal arts education will prepare you to work with people of all cultures and equip you with the skills to successfully pursue your career aspirations.

Philosophy, Politics & Economics

Climate change, mass migration, transnational business, human rights and artificial intelligence – just some of the complex challenges facing the world today. This new cross-disciplinary degree aims to prepare the next generation of leaders in both the public and private sectors. It will equip you as an all-round thinker and practitioner with the knowledge and skills to tackle both current and future issues worldwide.

This course offers cross-disciplinary breadth, integrating philosophical skills with political and economic knowledge of a pluralistic nature.

We'll encourage you to seek connections across disciplines and develop the applied, transferable skills needed to address world problems.

Leadership is a recurrent theme, and you'll learn how to adapt your approach to lead people and projects across cultures and industries.

A wide choice of elective modules (see page 5) offers the chance to explore other subjects, including languages and career planning.

At Regent's, you'll be part of a multicultural environment, similar to an international professional setting, where politics and economics are intertwined and underpinned by philosophical ideas and ethical norms.

There is an emphasis on practical skills and employability. You'll have the option to undertake an

Experiential Project (the equivalent of a work placement) to better equip you for real-life professional experience.

You'll also have the option to spend a term studying abroad at one of Regent's international partner institutions.

For your final-year project, you'll complete a major piece of work that synthesises all that you've learnt. Approaching a real-world dilemma, you'll research and propose practical solutions to resolve the problem.

Learning and assessment

You will be taught by expert faculty who are active in their fields, offering a high level of academic knowledge and professional experience.

Teaching methods are varied and include tutorials, interactive seminars, field trips, role play, simulations and lectures from guest speakers.

Assessment methods include written assignments, exams, presentations and group projects.

Our cross-disciplinary approach to PPE differentiates us from many others across the UK. Instead of examining these disciplines separately, we focus on the areas of overlap and explore how they work together to shape society.

Liberal Studies with Majors

A liberal arts education corresponds directly to the changing nature of the 21st century. It gives you the flexibility to design your own education and develop the knowledge and skills needed to successfully navigate the shifting landscape of modern-day life.

BA (Hons) Liberal Studies with Majors is modelled on the traditional US liberal arts degree. It enables you to concentrate on a major area of study while maintaining the breadth of learning that is central to a liberal arts education.

You will develop specialist knowledge in your major area of study, as well as more general life and employability skills.

The degree will also help you gain practical and professional skills for your future career, such as teamwork, problem-solving and critical thinking. You will also gain a better understanding of different cultures and develop a sense of personal and social responsibility. In Years' 1 and 2, you will take two liberal arts seminars in leadership and effective research. These degree-wide modules will help you develop transferrable skills that are useful in all aspects of life.

You will also have the option to complete a period of study abroad. We have partnerships with over 150

institutions around the world. Your choice of institution will depend on your major.

The Liberal Studies Capstone

In your final year, you will complete a major project that brings together the breadth of your learning and experience.

The Capstone can take the form of a reflective practice-based project or a traditional written dissertation. It will run over two semesters and will be supervised by a minimum of one supervisor.

Learning and assessment

You will be part of small, highly interactive classes that encourage collaboration and self-expression. A high level of contact with your tutors will enable you to develop your individual strengths, interests and style.

Tutors use a variety of approaches to help you learn and get the most out of your degree. Teaching methods include seminars, study groups, role plays, tutorials and external guest speakers.

You will learn through analysis, discussion and debate, practical problem-solving and teamwork, all of which are designed to help you develop as well-rounded individuals. You will gain key skills valuable to every workplace including critical thinking and decision-making.

Assessment methods vary according to the major and modules you choose, but may include essays, journals and reports, individual and group projects, creative portfolios, online exercises, presentations, tests and examinations.

Personal development

Completing this degree is not simply about the intellectual and practical skills you acquire, but also about your personal and professional development as an individual.

Throughout your degree, you will receive academic advice and support to help you make choices that encourage you to grow personally, as well as realise specific educational and professional aims.

■ BA (Hons) Liberal Studies (Art History)



Art has a profound impact on the way in which we understand the world around us. It has the ability to lend clarity to historical events and give substance to complex emotions. The Art History Major offers a critical exploration into this phenomenon.

You'll be introduced to visual art in all its diverse forms – from portraits to cityscapes, photography to street art, prints, fashion, architecture and even performance art.

Examining work from across the world will help you to understand how material culture can inform – and even contradict – global histories.

You'll engage in key topics such as feminism, philosophy, racism and religion.

The interdisciplinary nature of a liberal arts education will also help you to understand how art history relates to other fields such as business, history and international relations.

To understand the creative process fully, you will learn how to speak and write about art, as well as how to draw. Many classes are held in museums, galleries and auction houses across London to give you direct access to world-famous art. Guest lectures hosted by arts experts will also introduce you to new insights and career options.

You will be assessed through a mix of presentations, written work (including journals and essays), tests and exams.

■ BA (Hons) Liberal Studies (Business & Management)



The global business landscape is changing. New technologies and emerging markets are challenging traditional business models and changing the ways in which the world operates. This major examines and evaluates this global shift and provides the intensive training needed to successfully work in tomorrow's business landscape.

You'll study core business functions such as accounting, marketing and operations together with leadership and management skills. This combination will help you understand the complexities of business and people management processes.

The major will develop your knowledge and understanding of the nature of business, the various components of an organisation, and the management process.

It will also enable you to use practical tools and techniques to analyse business cases and management scenarios.

You will explore a wide range of aspects relevant in today's business world, and learn how to adapt and respond to challenging situations.

Practical projects will expose you to a variety of different business challenges and train you with the creative management strategies to overcome them. For example, you could be asked to manage and market a new organisational design, taking into consideration the ethical implications of the change management process.

You will also be able to take elective modules from across the Liberal Studies curriculum, exploring a wider range of intellectual interests alongside your major.

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■ BA (Hons) Liberal Studies (Criminology)



Criminology is a branch of sociology which explores the origins, extent and causes of crime and its impact upon societies. This major will equip you with the knowledge and skills to draw larger conclusions about the nature and effects of crime in order to develop effective and humane methods for preventing it.

The Criminology major offers a multidisciplinary approach to the study of crime and deviance, drawing on disciplines including law, politics and psychology. Approaching the perspectives of both the victim and the offender, this major seeks to challenge your common-sense beliefs about crime and justice.

You'll explore the theory and practice of crime control from the Enlightenment period through to the present day. From homicide and fraud to terrorism and cybercrime, this major covers a wide variety of crimes and key concepts in criminological thought.

You will examine the criminal justice systems and learn about the civil and criminal court structure as well as the principles that underpin the common law. This will give you an understanding of how the law operates within society, and the social, political and economic forces that influence it.

Opportunities to visit courtrooms and hear from crime experts will help to contextualise your studies and expose you to criminology in practice.

Forensic psychology is a key activity within the field of criminology. You'll learn the basic principles of this social science and its application within the context of criminal law.

You'll also examine the disproportionate effects of crime on particular social groups, touching on concepts such as class, gender, race and sexuality. To help you understand this complex relationship between crime and social division, you'll look at contemporary and historic movements and cases such as the Me Too campaign and the Stephen Lawrence case.

This major also examines transnational crime and the complex issues it creates for communities and nations. Approaching various crime networks such as drugs, arms

and trafficking, you'll explore how globalisation and the geopolitics of inequality and injustice has resulted in an increase in transnational crime.

Learning and assessment

Many of our academics continue to work at the forefront of social, political and policy debates surrounding crime and criminal justice. Their extensive experience has helped inform the curriculum, ensuring that you are taught the most cutting-edge criminological theories and practices. Teaching methods include interactive lectures, seminars, class discussions, guest talks and practical field trips.

We use a variety of assessment methods including formal exams and essays, individual and group presentations, research projects, reflection papers and book and article reviews. You will also undertake practical projects that enable you to apply the knowledge and skills you acquire during class to real life scenarios and case studies.

Studying criminology as part of a liberal arts degree will also equip you with a diverse skillset that is highly valued in other related careers such as journalism, the civil service, criminal justice, research and law.

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BA (Hons) Liberal Studies (International History)



The study of history enables us to understand how the past has helped shape the world of today and, by turn, how the present can impact and influence the world of tomorrow.

The International History major offers an in-depth insight into global history. By focusing on humankind's shared heritage, this major will shine a light on what unites – rather than divides – human beings across the world.

You will touch on a variety of different national histories including British history, the politics and cultural exchange between Europe and the Middle East, USA's influence on global politics and the historical development of China.

Taking a thematic rather than chronological approach, you will develop an understanding of how different cultures and civilisations connect, interact and evolve throughout history.

You will evaluate historical evidence, compare and contrast opposing viewpoints and draw your own conclusions about the world around you.

Elective modules will help you understand the breadth of this discipline and also give you a broad skillset. Options to learn a language and study abroad at one of our international partners will help expand your learning and develop your global outlook.

This degree will develop you into a highly employable individual who is able to pursue a career in fields as diverse as politics, publishing, archive and museum work, academia, and journalism.

Learning and assessment

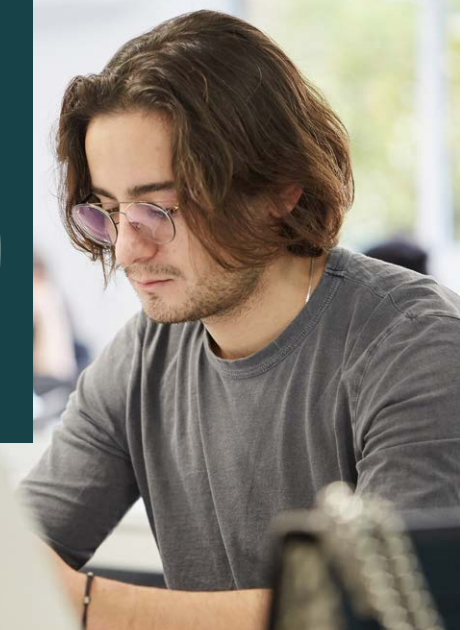

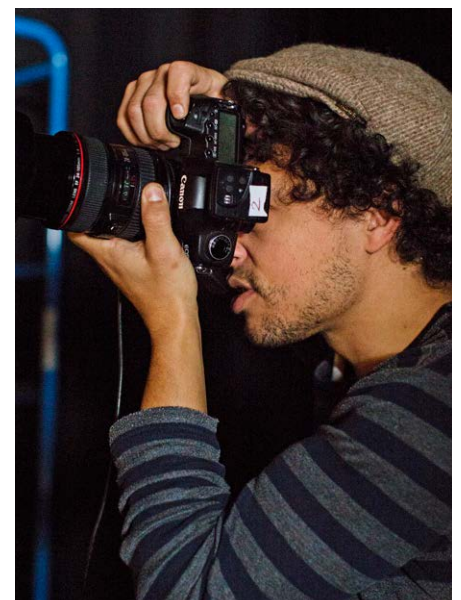

Knowledge of political issues is essential for anyone seeking to understand how societies across the world operate and distribute power and scarce resources. This course will introduce you to the political institutions and cultures of many different countries, giving you a broad and deep knowledge of the complexity of global politics.

The Political Science major offers a thorough grounding in key theoretical concepts used in the field. You will examine political institutions from across the world and critically analyse the ways in which they operate and distribute power and resources.

■ BA (Hons) Liberal Studies (Psychology)



The study of psychology offers a scientific examination into human behaviour and experience. Functioning as both an academic discipline and a vital professional practice, psychology helps us to understand why we think, feel and act in the ways that we do.

This major explores the core principles of psychology and covers both the theoretical and applied aspects of the science. You will gain a thorough grounding in the various different applications of this scientific field including social psychology, neuroscience, marketing psychology, and the psychology of fashion and sport.

You will also explore specific topics within this diverse field such as sexuality, cultural differences and similarities, and evolution and behaviour.

This major has a strong practical focus. You will have plenty of opportunities to undertake practical experiments using our specialist facilities. Your research findings will inform your understanding of different scientific theories and methodologies.

Our specialist equipment includes workstations equipped with experiment software, psychophysiological hardware, and software that records heart rate and brain electrical activity. We also have video and voice monitoring equipment, an eye-tracker with data analysis programmes, a comprehensive test library and laboratory space specifically dedicated to psychology teaching and researching testing.

The role of public relations has expanded rapidly in response to the growing link between a company's brand and reputation, and the increasing importance of new media channels. Today's PR executive must now underpin key PR fundamentals with company strategy and two-way communications.

The Public Relations major offers a thorough grounding in the history, theories and developments of the public relations industry. You will also learn about the law and ethics relating to PR and its practices. You will discover how PR professionals communicate ideas, generate press coverage and build strong reputations for their brand or client.

Applying to study at Regent's University London is a straightforward process. We accept direct applications all year round and there is no application fee.

You can also apply through UCAS (using the code R18) or via Common Application.

You can expect to receive a response regarding your application within 10 working days from when we receive your completed application and supporting documents.

If you still have to finish your education, we will issue a conditional offer. If you have met all the conditions, we will send you an unconditional offer.

Our private status means that even if you have already made five choices via the UCAS system, you can still make a sixth application by applying directly to us.

Visa requirements

Students who require a Tier 4 (General) visa to study in the UK may be required to meet specific grade requirements and conditions of study as stipulated by UK Visas and Immigration. Please check their website for current information:

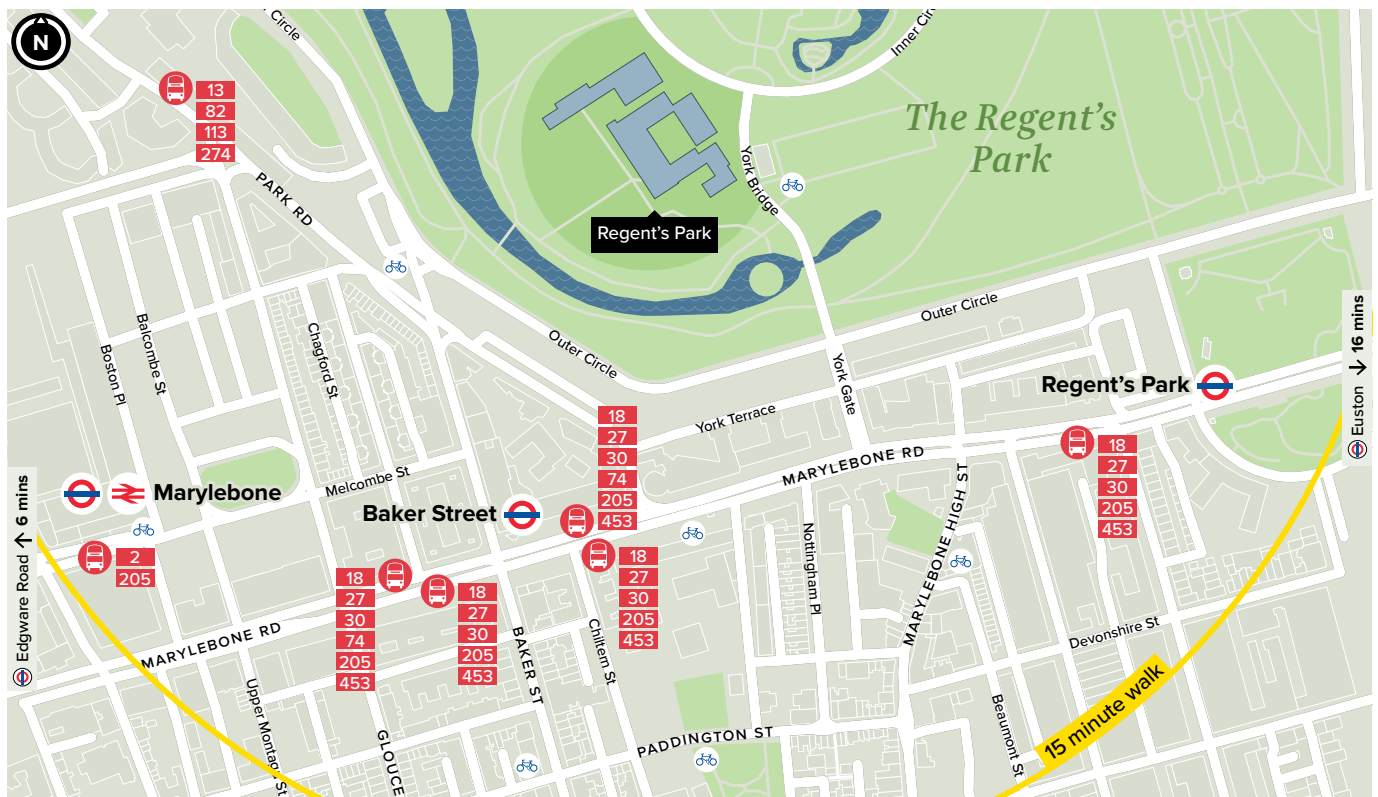

By Underground

Take the London Underground (Tube) to Baker Street station.

From Baker Street Station

Take the Marylebone Road exit. Turn left and walk past Madame Tussauds.

Take the first left at York Gate. Continue over the bridge into the park. The University entrance is on the left.

By Road

Our campus is just off the A501 (Marylebone Road) in central London.

From London Heathrow Airport

Heathrow Express train service to Paddington station. London Underground from Paddington to Baker Street station. Total journey time approximately 35 minutes.

From London Gatwick Airport

Gatwick Express train service to Victoria station. London Underground from Victoria to Baker Street station. Total journey time approximately 60 minutes.

From London City Airport
