1. Module description

This module traces intellectual and cultural currents in France from the Enlightenment period in the 18th century through Revolution to the birth of Impressionism. You will be encouraged to analyse the art of the period using a range of different frameworks including Marxist views of the British landscape painting of Gainsborough and Constable, Orientalist fantasies in 19th century art, evidence of colonialism in the work of Hogarth, the role of the black model in 19th century French art and feminist interpretations of Impressionist subject matter. The role of the academy in promoting artists and selling their work and the influence of art criticism will also form a theme throughout the module.

2. Learning outcomes

Upon successful completion of this module you will be able to:

Decision-making (MLO 04)

Investigate and contrast different ideas, including your own, to inform decision making when discussing European works of art from the 18th and 19th century

Communication (MLO 05)

Communicate effectively your arguments and reasoning about 18th and 19th century European art

Examine and apply theories, concepts and facts about a range of subjects from 18th and 19th century European art

Employ art historical knowledge, analytical techniques and design and digital tools to compare and contrast 18th and 19th century works of art.

3. Learning and teaching methods

This module will take place both in and out of the classroom. In class sessions will consist of introduction of key ideas and concepts, for example on Orientalism, the careers of women artists or the role of black models in the period, followed by discussion and debate in which you will be asked to analyse works of art and give short presentations. Field trips to museums and galleries will give you the opportunity to see works of art in the original, introducing you to how to use key primary research methodologies alongside secondary source reading when evaluating a work of art.

Assessment 2: Essay Weight (%): 60%

Word Count or Equivalent: 2,000 words

You will research and write an essay to allow more in-depth research into one area covered during the module where you will examine and apply theories and concepts and communicate your arguments and reasoning on a subject of your choice.

Each summative assessment will be preceded by an opportunity of formative assessment accompanied by formative feedback.
